Curriculum Intent			
To gain a mastery in the discipline of English Literature and written communication in a formal register. We aim for students to become successful learners who continue to explore and develop ideas that are built upon the Catholic Ethos. We often use the texts at the heart of our curriculum to explore fundamental ideas such as Love, Respect, Honesty, Responsibility and Justice which will then help develop the students so that they are ready to navigate life beyond school with Catholic values underpinning their choices. English Literature is an 'A' Level subject that leads into a wide variety of careers and university courses; we aim to give all students every opportunity to succeed in the subject and in their chosen pathways after leaving the Sixth Form.
